#### 16th Infantry at D-Day

JUNE 6, 1944

When we discuss the Indian Wars, we often think of the regiments in distant terms. Today we are as distant from WWII as those of WWII were from the Civil War. In March, we examined the 16th Infantry's command of Fort Concho in the early 1880s. Their story continued as they joined Operation Overlord, being among the first wave to land on Omaha Beach. The 16th Infantry is still active at Fort Riley, KS.

Yesterday, San Angelo broke ground for a new monument honoring locals and those from nearby counties who served in World War II. The continuous service of the 16th infantry and recognizing those who served before us reminds us of the dedication, bravery, and sacrifice needed for us to maintain our values and principles that shape this great nation.

# Battle of Olustee

For the second year, Fort Concho packed up the sibley, an A-frame, and the desire for learning as we headed Florida for the Battle of Olustee 160th. The ladies joined the civilians while the Confederate camp flooded due to heavy rains. Katelyn and Rhett brought with them two chickens named Stew and Dumplings. The chickens defiance to run through the woods led to one being dinner a day early and the other was raided by the Confederates but we compromised with the camp and shared dinner with the men.


