In House Living History Training

April 17 through 18th

Fort Concho's Living History unit has exploded in growth these past couple of years. With new recruits, we wanted to be able to cover details in a way you can't within a two-hour program. So for twentysix hours, we enlisted, drilled, skirmished, drilled even more, cooked over a fire, and posted a guard outside of the barracks. The new recruits were led by Robert Broene who has spent many years working through and practicing Emory Upton's Infantry manual. Upton's words were translated into every action of the recruits. Fort Concho has been invited to help with the three-volley salute for funerals and ceremonies. This training allowed for everyone to practice so the fort can better honor others.

The best part of the evening was we spent hours just discussing the different tactics the Army used during the Civil War, the Indian Wars, and even twentieth-century conflicts. The recruits clearly have spent time studying Fort Concho's time period to be better prepared when discussing military history with the public.

Flaq Day celebrates the adoption of the American flag that Americans see flying every day. To help pay respect to the flag and its significance, Fort Concho will be helping in the proper disposal of retired American flags. The process will follow the U.S. Flag Code. "The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning." On June 14th, please bring your retired flags to Barracks 1 or that evening from 6 PM to 8 PM and we will properly dispose of them. If you would like to assist in the proper retiring of your flag, please join us in the evening outside of Barracks 1. (Please note if your flag is made of cotton or polyester. Disposal of flags depends on the materials it is made of.)

Fort Concho Summer Embroidery Program is designed to teach participants embroidery skills they can use for the rest of their lives. While they embroider, they also get to know the other participants. Fort Concho hopes to teach the participants the basics of embroidery, including threading a needle, how to assemble fabric in a hoop, the running stitch, and the backstitch. If there is additional time, participants will learn more complex stitches. Participants will be allowed to keep their hoop, finished products, and needle upon completing the program.
