Battle of Olustee

On February 17, Ehren Thomas, Luca Lohse, and I drove from Fort McKavett to Lake City, Florida for the annual Battle of Olustee reenactment. The drive was seventeen hours straight, adding one hour for Ehren and Luca coming from San Angelo. We arrived on Friday morning at about 9 AM EST and we promptly set up Fort Concho's Sibley tent. Brigadier General James Permane, commander of the Federal forces, was kind enough to loan us a center pole for the tent. Unfortunately, the pole was too big for the pyramid, so we hoisted the entire tent over a small pine tree and found it worked just as well! Immediately, word spread throughout the camps that three Texans brought a Sibley tent from over a thousand miles away.

When Saturday morning arrived, the three of us were detailed with our company to prepare rations. We portrayed the 6th Florida Infantry, under the command of Major Walter Cook. We participated in company and battalion drills during the midmorning, went sutler shopping and touring in the late morning, and met many friends I had not seen in nearly two years (COVID canceled 2021's event). In the early afternoon, it was time for battle.

Saturday's battle was intense, with one of my friends from Savannah dislocating his shoulder and another participant getting struck in the eyebrow with a flag finial, causing profuse bleeding. As dangerous as battle reenactments sound, everyone exercised the utmost safety, and these few incidents were promptly handled by professional medical personnel. Neither wounded man wanted to leave the mock fight. Despite being a Confederate victory, Saturday's battle is fought to a draw to be fair to the Federal reenactors. The real commemorative battle is fought on Sunday.

Saturday evening was one of the most fun times of the event, in my opinion. I toured around Confederate, Union, civilian, and sutler camps, conversing with old friends and even a former coworker from Fort McAllister. Later that evening there was a large ball, and I must say that one may never have seen so many hoop skirts in one area. Live music played and a dance caller guided us on reels, polkas, waltzes, and many others from 7 to 11 PM.

That night the temperature dropped to almost freezing, which is unusual for Florida even in the winter. The Sibley stove kept us warm the previous night, but this time the door was shut and the fire snuffed out. The three of us recall two of my friends desperately trying to bring the fire back with a twig and a lighter. That worked as well as one can imagine. Sunday involved a memorial service with both Union and Confederate brigades gathering around the monument erected in 1912 to commemorate the fallen, both in 1864 and in the last two years. Every year the reenactment holds this memorial service. Participants who had family in the military who had passed away are given mention before a moment of silence. The battle followed a few hours later, and this time, the Confederates swept the field.

On the exact date of the battle, February 20, the 6th Florida reenactors charged with a fierce rebel yell and joined their wavering comrades on the battlefield. In full view of the public, no less than 1,000 viewers, we charged the Federal forces and routed them, taking a few prisoners in the process. After a final commemoration, the armies split and everyone broke camp.

As a final goodbye, the three of us shared some champagne and wine with the Confederate Brigade commander, Brigadier General Hunter Poythress, and his wife, Stacy. We drove to Fort Blakeley near Mobile, Alabama, and arrived around midnight. The park ranger, and also our company first sergeant, Brian DesRochers, was kind enough to let us stay overnight. Monday morning began the twelve hours home, and we arrived at my house a little after midnight on February 22.

Despite being a long drive both ways, there was so much to see, do, learn, and take home. Ehren even bought an original bugle from one of my friends and will be using it at future events here in Texas. We hope to go again next year, and most certainly, the 160th anniversary in 2024.

Rhett and others will be attending this event again this year! The 46th annual battle of Olustee Reenactment will commemorate their 159th anniversary on February 17 through 19, 2023.
